Mr. KIESS, from the Committee on Printing, submitted the following

REPORT

[To accompany S. Con. Res. 12]

The Committee on Printing, to whom was referred the resolution (S. Con. Res. 12), to provide for the printing of the Constitution of the United States as amended to April 15, 1926, together with the Declaration of Independence, as a Senate document, have considered the same and report favorably thereon with the recommendation that the resolution do pass without amendment.

This resolution provides for the printing of 3,500 additional copies of the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence for distribution through the document rooms of Congress. The superintendents of the document rooms have informed your committee that there is a constant demand made direct to them from the school children throughout the country for copies of the Constitution, but as the supply is entirely exhausted, the last print having been ordered by Congress in 1913, these requests can not be complied with.

Mr. Kiser, from the Committee on Printing, submitted the following

REPORT

IN ACCORDANCE WITH RESOLUTION NO. 1235

The Committee on Printing to which was referred the resolution of the House of Representatives, passed May 12, 1928, to provide for the printing of the Constitution of the United States as amended to April 12, 1928, together with the Declaration of Independence, as a separate document, have considered the same and report favorably thereon with the recommendation that the resolution be passed without amendment.

The resolution provides for the printing of 8,000 additional copies of the Constitution of the United States and the Declaration of Independence for distribution through the document rooms of Congress. The superintendents of the document rooms have informed your committee that there is a constant demand and a shortage of them in the select edition throughout the country for copies of the Constitution, but as the supply is entirely exhausted, the last print having been ordered by Congress in 1913, the request can not be complied with.
