REPORT :

[To accompany bill S. 99.]

*The Committee on the Judiciary, to whom were referred sundry memorials asking a modification of the naturalization laws of the United States, and which said committee was instructed by the Senate to make certain inquiries in relation to the said naturalization laws, and the proceedings had under them, ask leave to submit the following report, in part performance of the duties assigned to them :*

The committee have given their earnest attention to this subject, as well because of its intrinsic importance as from respect to the public feeling which has been manifested in relation to it. In pursuance of the authority given to them by the Senate, they have issued commissions, which are in process of execution, for the purposes of the inquiries which they have been directed to make. In the mean time, from an examination of the existing laws, and from such sources of information as were immediately accessible to them, they have prepared a bill, which is calculated, as they believe, to supply the more prominent defects of the present system of naturalization, which they are induced now to submit to the Senate, from a consideration of the short time allowed to the present session of Congress, and of the importance of taking some definitive action on this subject before that session closes; postponing their further and final report on the resolutions and memorials referred to them, until they shall have received returns to the commissions which have been issued. The committee ask leave, therefore, to report the accompanying bill.
