JOINT RESOLUTION.

Be it resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Louisiana, in General Assembly convened, That the senators and representatives of the State of Louisiana, in Congress, be requested to obtain from the general government, permission in favor of the corporation of the town of Baton Rouge, and of such persons as the said corporation may select, to enclose and use as a cemetery a portion of the grounds attached to the United States barracks in Baton Rouge.
